He enjoys using metaphors and similes when telling tales.

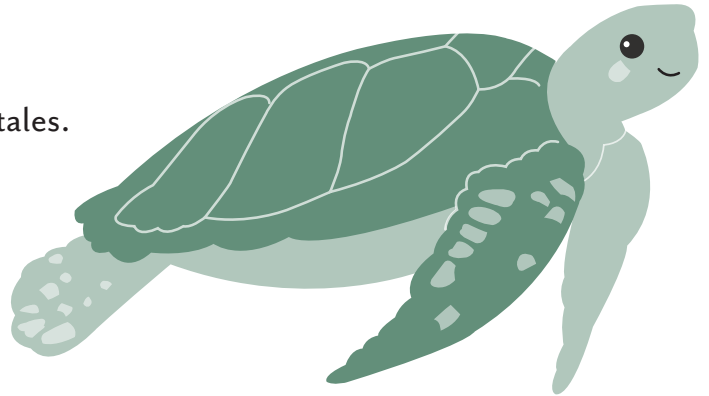
A **metaphor** is a figure of speech that compares two things that are not actually alike.

Metaphors compare things by saying something is something else.

Example: *Tennyson's eyes are pitch black pebbles.*

A **simile** is a figure of speech that compares two unlike things by using the words *like* or *as*.

Example: *Tennyson's eyes are like pitch black pebbles.*

My home, a moss covered rock, is an emerald fortress. It provides shelter from the heavy springtime showers, when the raindrops are like large **iridescent** pearls. My rock is neighbors with a weeping willow tree. Its branches are thick snakes, but to the children who come to swim from town, the willow is a **majestic** pirate ship.
