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
Sequoyah's Special Symbols

- When you want to send a message, you can write words for someone to read. However, not everyone knows how to read and write. There are even some languages that do not have a written form. The Cherokee language, used by Cherokee Native Americans in the United States, was a language without a written form. For hundreds of years, this language was only spoken. Then a man named Sequoyah figured out a way to use symbols so people could read and write the Cherokee language for the first time.
- Sequoyah was born in the mountains of Tennessee about 1776. His mother was Cherokee and his father was a white fur trader and soldier. Sequoyah grew up in Arkansas and later moved to Indian Territory in what is now the state of Oklahoma.
- During the War of 1812, Sequoyah joined the United States Army. While he was in the army, he saw other soldiers writing letters home to their families. Sequoyah called these papers "talking leaves." Sequoyah also saw that the soldiers could read and write about things that happened to them. Sequoyah and other Cherokee could not do this. Sequoyah decided to create a written language for his people. That way, they could read and write, too.
- After the war, Sequoyah went home and listened carefully to the sounds in the Cherokee language. After twelve years, he had come up with a list of eighty-five sounds that could form any word in Cherokee. Then he created a different symbol

for each sound. Because the symbols do not stand for letters, Sequoyah's invention is not called an alphabet. Instead, it is called a syllabary.

Sequoyah wanted to teach his syllabary to other Cherokee. 5 He made a game out of his writing and taught it to his young daughter, Ayoka. Together they taught the syllabary to the Cherokee people. Sequoyah and Ayoka traveled all over the United States to teach Cherokee to others. Within a few months, thousands of Cherokee knew how to read and write. By 1834, books and songs had been written down in Cherokee. There was also a Cherokee newspaper.

Sequoyah wanted to create a common language that all Native Americans could speak. He spent the rest of his life traveling around the United States talking to other Native American tribes. However, he was not able to achieve this dream.




These are some of the symbols used in Sequoyah's syllabary.

Sequoyah died around 1843, but he is not forgotten. He was the first Cherokee to create a system of writing and then teach it to others. Because of his work, Sequoyah received awards from the Cherokee Nation and the United States Congress. He is one of the best-known Native Americans in history.
